Who would you be most like in

the Christmas Story?

Several years ago, I was retelling the Christmas story at a school Nativity and I asked the Question to the children, "Who are you in the Christmas Story?"

Now I promise, as part of our sermon series, I am not going to ask you to dress up but I would like to pose the same Question to you, "Who would you be most like in the Christmas Story?"

Because as I was planning our sermon series "The characters of Christmas, I could see many parallels between the Characters the Bible Portrays and People of our day. After all, Isn't the Bible really a Mirror for us to look into, that we might see ourselves?

Let me Explain Some folks are Represented by the Innkeeper..... the scapegoats of Christmas, Mean?, Hostile? Constantly busy, facing problems from all different directions yet for a while they forgot their own personal problems long enough to extend hospitality and kindness to Mary and Joseph who needed them in their desperate hour.

Some folks are Represented by Joseph, a man with strong beliefs. prepared to do what was right for the sake of his family, the burden of poverty thrust upon him as he found himself amongst the vast ranks of refugees journeying down the centuries.

Then there's the shepherds, steadfast watchmen isolated and alone, far from the warmth of home, doing the job no one wants. They were outsiders, religious outcasts and yet God saw them and valued them.

Oh, but then there are the Wise Men, who we know had great wealth, because they were able to give great treasures to Jesus. They had everything the world could offer but there was something missing in their lives. They had a spiritual hunger that drove them to the highest goal. They were seeking the King of Kings: Seeking to find Him, seeking to know Him, seeking to get close to Him, seeking to worship Him.

And then of course there is Mary, innocent and powerful, sacred and scared, worried, she fearfully stepped out in faith as she believed that God's intention was to do good to her. She knew that he is a God who exalts the humble and shows mercy to those who trust in him.

When you start to think about it that way, you realise that the Christmas story, like

most stories, have different characters, some play greater and lesser roles. There are those who play the main characters, and then others who are in the background playing supporting roles. Yet each character was critical to the story of the birth of the Christ Child.

Hence my hope this Advent, as we slow down, and enter into the stories of these men and women, that you will see that God uses even the most "minor" character to illustrate the central importance of the baby's birth and that each of them in their own way point to the greatest character in the Christmas story: Jesus.



Why is Turkey so popular at Christmas?

Because the weather is a lot hotter over there this time of the year.

How many black historical figures can you name?

The results of a recent YouGov survey show that at least 50% of Britons cannot name one Black historical figure. It seems most of us know little about our Black British history. Contrary to popular belief that the first black people migrated to Britain in the last 200 years or less, it appears that people migrated from Africa and settled here some 2000 years ago.

Results from the survey also showed a drastic under estimation of Britain's involvement in the trans-Atlantic slave trade. Only 12% of people thought that more than a million people were taken. Shockingly, the true figure was more than three times that amount. Even more shameful is the way in which attempts have been made to erase the part played by many people of colour who helped build the Britain we know, in the fields of science, sport, literature and law. There have always been people with black or brown skin in Britain, from the stone age through to the present day.

We know one of the Roman Governors of Britain between the years 139 and 142 was a black man by the name of Quintus Lollius Urbicus.

A former black slave Olaudah Equiano became a



prominent abolitionist and writer. Taken as a slave with his sister as a child his experiences as a slave enabled him to write an honest account of the brutality of slavery. His Christian faith sustained him throughout his life.

We've all heard of Florence Nightingale but not



so much of the black nurse Mary Seacole who also provided care for British soldiers during the Crimean War

Thankfully her work has been recognised in recent years.

There are also many black people who have been involved in the creative arts, such as the composer Samuel Coleridge -Taylor. Much of their work has been ignored over the years. In our multi-racial society there is a need for more Black British history to be covered in our schools and universities. It is only through greater knowledge and understanding that we can avoid further divisions in our society.
